Ringelblum resisted through preserving a record of what the Nazis did in Warsaw and hiding the records in canisters he buried underground. Two of the three canisters he buried have been recovered.

Honorable Jody Chaitovitz's uncle, Col. Harold Gershon (Ret.), an Air Force bombardier, was shot down on his 25th bombing mission over Germany. He survived and was sent to a Prisoner of War camp in Germany. As the war was coming to its end, the camp Kommandant determined that Col. Gershon should be sent to Barth Concentration Camp, despite his rank as an American officer, and despite attempts by his fellow prisoners to forge documents reflecting his heritage as French and his religion as Catholic. As he was almost to the gas chambers, "Barth on the Baltic," as it was known to its mostly Greek and Italian Jewish prisoners, was liberated by the Russians who broke down the gates of the camp. My uncle was freed, and continued his service in the U.S. Air Force, ending his career as Military Attaché to our embassy in Madrid.

Colonel Harold Gershon, POW

Survived, since passed away

Arlene and Leonard Cohen and their parents were born in the USA. They had many family members who were murdered during the Holocaust. Arlene's relatives were born in Warsaw. In Leonard's family, Pearl Mandelker Benisch survived Auschwitz and Bergen-Belsen, and wrote a book, Vanquish the Dragon, about her experiences, and lives in Borough Park, Brooklyn, NY. Mendel Mandelker survived the Holocaust and later died in the U.S. Pearl and Mendel were the only members of their immediate family to survive the Holocaust. Many of Leonard's family perished in Belzec in June, 1942.
